January 3rd and 4th 2026 is an important weekend for the Missouri Knights of Columbus. We once again reserve the first weekend in January to distribute over 60,000 Roses for Life to parishes and other churches in our communities across the State. By signing these Roses, Knights, parishioners and Pro-Life supporters show their commitment to human life in all stages, from conception until natural death. These Roses have been distributed to our District Deputies for delivery to their Councils. As a suggestion to the members of the parishes and Christian churches that distribute these roses, please remove the paper from the stem of the Rose, keeping the beautiful flower as a reminder to pray for the end of abortion. By placing the signed slips in the mail without the Rose makes a much smaller package and eliminates the tangled wires. By signing the papers from the Roses, which symbolize our commitment to life, should be sent directly to your elected officials, pro-choice legislators in particular. Our goal is to remind them of the thousands of Missouri Pro-Life supporters; we once again start the battle to support the victims of abortion. We remember the unborn with our daily prayers, but we also pray in support for the families who are troubled by their past decisions. By distributing these Roses on January 3rd and 4th gives time for delivery to your State and U.S. Representatives before January 22nd, 2026, which is the 45th anniversary of *Roe v. Wade* Supreme Court decision. As Catholics we suffered a defeat at the ballot box last year. Unfortunately the enormous amount of money coming from out of state narrowly passed a ballot initiative Amendment 3, which allowed no regulations on the abortion industry in protection of mothers, it also allowed abortion up to the date of birth. We as Catholics will now start to pickup the pieces. We will strive to protect the unborn and the mothers who make a difficult decision at a difficult time. On November 3, 2026 we take up the battle to ensure changes are being made to limit the amount of last years ballot loss

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to:

- Repeal the 2024 voter-approved Amendment providing reproductive healthcare rights, including abortion through fetal viability;
- Allow abortions for rape and incest (under twelve-weeks' gestation), emergencies, and fetal anomalies;
- Allow legislation regulating abortion;
- Allow legislation to regulate abortion providers and facilities to ensure health and safety.
- Ensure parental consent for minors' abortions;
- Prohibit gender transition procedures for minors? A "yes" vote will repeal Article I, Section 36, of the Missouri Constitution approved by the voters in 2024 which provided reproductive healthcare rights, including abortion through fetal viability; continue to ensure women's ability to access medical care for medical emergencies, ectopic pregnancies, and miscarriages; allow legislation to regulate abortion providers and facilities to ensure health and safety; require informed and voluntary consent for an abortion, including parental or judicial consent for minors; allow restriction of abortions to cases of medical emergency, rape and incest under twelve weeks gestation, and fetal anomalies; prohibit public funding of abortions except in limited circumstances; and prohibit gender transition procedures for minors including gender transition surgeries, cross-sex hormones or puberty-blocking drugs, with exceptions for specific medical conditions. A "no" vote will leave Article I, Section 36, of the Missouri Constitution approved by voters in 2024 in place; will not limit abortion to cases of medical emergency, rape and incest under twelve weeks gestation, and fetal anomalies, but leave access to abortion available through fetal viability; will not prohibit gender transition procedures for minors.

As Supreme Representative - PSD John Appelbaum spoke so eloquently at the Missouri Mid Year meeting, "this ballot initiative is not perfect, but we have to pick our battles." State Deputy Michael Auchly so aptly stated "If ever there was a time for the Knights to be the strong right arm of the church, the time is now. We are the boots Pon the ground in defense of our Catholic faith. We have an opportunity to right this wrong but only if we use our voices to be heard."

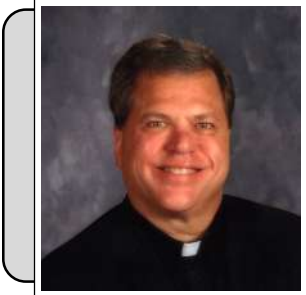

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience... And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection... And let the peace of Christ control your hearts, the peace into which you were also called in one body. And be thankful! [Colossian 3:12, 14-15]

All of us have had mornings when we just stand in front of our closet and debate what clothes you will wear today. St. Paul, in the scripture verse above, is encouraging us to get up every morning and choose- to literally, make the choice- to put on Virtue and turn away from evil. Let the Holy Spirit give you what you need every day to be clothed to face the world and look attractive enough to draw others to the goodness of God.

As Advent begins this new Liturgical year, trust in your baptism and know that each of us is God's chosen son or daughter -Holy and Beloved. Unlike Adam and Eve who wanted to become like God, a grateful child of God truly appreciates the many talents one has received from God and shares the gift. [Joshua 24:15]

STATE PROGRAM DIR. CHUCK PAQUETTE SAYS:

The Supreme Knights of Columbus, “Faith in Action” programs, provide local Councils with specific, organized ways to live out the Order’s founding principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism. The programs are grouped into four main categories: **Faith, Family, Community, and Life.** The following is a list of prominent programs, categorized by their focus, along with a brief description of each: **I. Faith Programs** These programs support the spiritual lives of Knights and their families, as well as the needs of the parish and clergy.



- **Into the Breach:** A spiritual formation program encouraging Catholic men to embrace virtues, often using study groups to discuss the Apostolic Exhortation *Into the Breach*.
- **Cor:** A new initiative centered on developing a Christ-centered brotherhood through consistent, intentional gatherings focused on prayer, formation, and fraternity.
- **Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP):** Councils “adopt” seminarians or postulants, providing them with financial aid and moral support on their journey to the priesthood or religious life.
- **Rosary Program:** Promotes devotion to the Rosary within families and parishes by scheduling regular communal prayer services.
- **Building the Domestic Church Kiosk:** Provides engaging, faith-based literature and Catholic Information Service booklets for councils to distribute to members and the public to strengthen family faith life.

II. Family Programs These initiatives aim to strengthen Catholic families and foster family-oriented fraternity.

- **Family of the Month:** Honors a deserving family in the parish each month who lives out Catholic values and sets a good example through their faith and service.
- **Family Week:** Encourages councils to sponsor events and activities that promote family togetherness, prayer, and fun.
- **Consecration to the Holy Family:** Guides families to formally dedicate themselves to the Holy Family through prayer and reflection.
- **Adopt a Widow (or Similar Support):** Programs designed to offer social contact, assistance, and support to the spouses of deceased members.

III. Community Programs The focus here is on serving the local community, especially those in need, through various forms of assistance.

- **Knights of Columbus Coats for Kids®:** Provides new winter coats to children in need across the United States and Canada.
- **Global Wheelchair Mission:** Raises funds to donate wheelchairs to people with disabilities worldwide, often done through matching grants.
- **Habitat for Humanity:** Partnering with the global organization to build homes for families in need of affordable housing.
- **Food for Families:** Councils organize food drives and provide material support to local food pantries and soup kitchens to combat hunger.
- **Special Olympics:** Supports the Special Olympics through volunteering, fundraising, and helping to celebrate the intrinsic worth of all people with intellectual disabilities.

IV. Life Programs These programs promote the culture of life, supporting mothers, children, and people with special needs, from conception to natural death.

- **Ultrasound Initiative:** Councils and the Supreme Council partner to raise funds to purchase and donate ultrasound machines to pro-life pregnancy centers.
- **Aid and Support After Pregnancy (ASAP):** Provides material and spiritual support to pregnant women, new mothers, and their babies through local pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes.
- **March for Life:** Organizes and encourages Knights and their families to attend pro-life marches and rallies to show public support for the right to life.
- **Novena for Life:** Leads the community in prayer, typically over nine days, to spiritually fight to establish a culture of life.
- **Christian Refugee Relief:** Provides aid, often financial and material, to persecuted and at-risk Christians and other religious minorities facing crises globally.

Cor programs help build stronger men through prayer, fellowship and Scripture. Stronger men mean stronger families, churches, and communities. Beckham Cothren, a member of Immaculate Conception Parish in Montgomery City, MO and recent member of Knights of Columbus Council 2044 was inducted into the Naval Academy Class of 2029 on June 26, 2025. He is currently in his Fourth Class (4/C) year at the academy where he plans to major in Aerospace Engineering. Beckham joined the Knights of Columbus in his local parish prior to departing for the Academy.

Beckham places high importance on his new membership and even with his busy schedule continues his membership at the Knights of Columbus Council at the United States Naval Academy. He is also a member of the Catholic Midshipman Club, the Trap and Skeet team, ARES (Adaptive Rapid Engagement Squadron), and serves as the Seventh Company class of 2029 Honor Representative.

Founded in 1845, the U.S. Naval Academy is a prestigious four-year service academy that prepares midshipmen morally, mentally, and physically to be professional officers in the naval service. More than 4,400 men and women representing every state in the U.S. and several foreign countries make up the student body, known as the Brigade of Midshipmen. In 2025, U.S. News and World Reports rated the Naval Academy as the #1 public school, #5 undergraduate engineering school, and #3 national liberal arts college. Midshipmen learn from military and civilian instructors and participate in intercollegiate varsity sports and extracurricular activities.

They also study subjects such as leadership, ethics, small arms, drill, seamanship and navigation, tactics, naval engineering and weapons, and military law. Upon graduation, midshipmen earn a Bachelor of Science degree and go on to serve at least five years of service as commissioned officers in the U.S. Navy or U.S. Marine Corps.

The Brigade of Midshipmen is comprised of approximately 4,400 students from every state in the union and a handful of international students. Each year, approximately 1,200 young men and women are admitted to the Naval Academy's incoming class



MOScholars Tax Credit Program

In 2021 legislation was passed by the State of Missouri establishing the MOScholars Tax Credit Program. Businesses and individuals can redirect up to 50% of state income tax liability to an education organization, for example the Bright Futures Fund in the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph and Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau & Joplin, www.BrightFuturesFund.org. The individual or business can purchase a tax credit to be used in the payment of state tax obligations. The tax credits may be carried forward for four additional tax years and are equal to 100% of an eligible contribution and can be used for up to 50% of the donor's annual tax liability. All of these funds provide Catholic school scholarships to eligible families based on income or if the child has a learning challenge, furthering the legacy each student carries forward in their faith life. 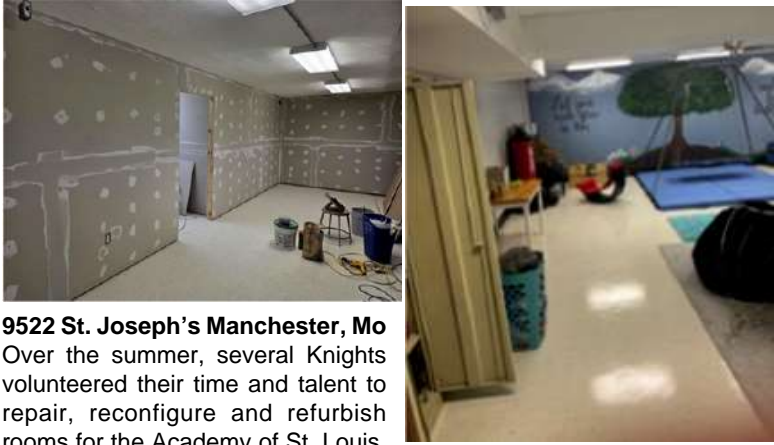
